# **NOTABLE NEWS ITEMS**

### MYP Information from Ms. Sisson....

Though the MYP continues with the development of new MYP units, this year's particular MYP focus has been on training the staff in the teaching and learning strategies involved in Inquiry and on introducing the staff to the requirements of the personal project. The personal project will be rolled out in full next year to all 10<sup>th</sup> grade students.

At the heart of the MYP is inquiry. One goal of inquiry is to develop students' ability to create their own questions thereby taking ownership of their own learning. When this occurs, the classroom is transformed from a passive learning environment to an active, dynamic space in which all participate and share ideas.

Inquiry is difficult to define as it is a stance and a concept rather than a practice and a skill. Inquiry informs how teachers approach their teaching and their curriculum. In an inquiry classroom, curricular understanding does not become an end in itself. Instead, understanding piques curiosity and raises more questions. Further, inquiry emphasizes the big ideas- the concepts- to which the curriculum points. Concepts have interdisciplinary and real world application. The result: students see how what they do in a particular class not only relates to other classes but to the world outside of the classroom as well. The ultimate goal of inquiry is for students to be problem-posers as well as problem-solvers. Thus, NCHS students will be well equipped to manage the complex world at large.

The personal project allows students to research a topic of personal interest. The personal project is the culminating event of the MYP. The key pieces of the personal project are the process journal documenting students' process and progress over the course of their project, a final report and an exhibition during which students display and discuss the final product/outcome they have created. Both the process journal and the report can be completed in writing, as an audio entry or even as a film. Last year we had a personal project pilot that involved 13 teacher volunteers and approximately 11 students. This year, all NCHS department chairs and administration including our Principal, Mr. Branigan, as well as volunteers from CEC are working with two student volunteers each for a total involvement of approximately

In the next message I will explain what the training involves and update you on the progress of this year's personal project pilot.

## APPLYING TO COLLEGE.....

Our processing forms are available on the south wall of the Guidance Office near the Student Center entrance. Turn them in to your counselor IN PERSON, allowing at least TWO WEEKS for your counselor to process your materials.

- **PINK SHEET** Submit one for EACH college application, with a parent/guardian signature on the back of the first one; there is a \$1 processing fee for each Pink Sheet.
- WHITE SHEET Student Information Sheet detailing honors, activities, work, etc.
- YELLOW SHEET Counselor Recommendation Worksheet
- **GREEN SHEET** Teacher Recommendation Worksheet (this one goes to your teacher)
- TRANSCRIPTS Register with <u>www.parchment.com</u> and have your transcripts sent electronically
- TEST SCORES Arrange to have them sent directly from the testing agencies to the colleges
